New plant health controls on products imported from the EU from 1 January 2022?

From 1 January 2022, new plant health controls on products imported from the EU, Switzerland and Liechtenstein (excluding Ireland) are being phased in. This starts with 'regulated and notifiable' EU produce and cut flowers requiring pre-notification. You can watch a youtube video on this here.

New requirements will be introduced for importing some SPS goods to GB from the EU from 1 January 2022

From 1 January 2022 pre-notification will be required for imports to GB of most Products of Animal Origin, Animal By-Products, High Risk Food and Feed not of Animal Origin and regulated plants and plant products from the EU. Businesses (or a representative acting on their behalf) importing these goods from the EU may be required to pre-notify authorities on the relevant IT system that their consignment will be entering Great Britain.

Requirements for EU origin goods transiting from an EU country to another EU country via Great Britain

There are new requirements for EU origin goods transiting from an EU country to another EU country via Great Britain (GB). Please read this quidance for full information.

Full customs controls start on 1 January 2022

From 1 January 2022, full customs declarations will be needed on all imports from the EU. Current arrangements will continue to apply to goods moving from the island of Ireland to Great Britain while discussions on the Northern Ireland Protocol (NIP) are continuing.

HMRC has written to traders to remind them of the changes to customs controls and how they might affect the way goods are imported and exported.

The changes coming into force on 1 January 2022 include:

- Requirement for full customs import declarations for all goods at the time traders or their courier/freight forwarder bring them into Great Britain, except if they are non-controlled goods imported from Ireland to Great Britain;
- Making sure traders (or their agent) submit the correct customs export declaration if you are exporting goods;
- Customs controls at all ports and other border locations;
- Requirement for a suppliers' declaration proving the origin of goods (either UK or EU) if traders are using the zero tariffs agreed in the UK's trade deal with the EU; and
- Commodity codes, which are used to classify goods for customs declarations, are changing.

Lord Frost Departure

On 18 December it was announced that the Foreign Secretary is to become lead negotiator with the EU on the Northern Ireland Protocol, following the departure of Lord Frost. Webinars and on demand videos

The UK Government continues to run a series of webinars and on demand videos across a range of topics relating to the new rules and procedures.

We are aware that there remains lots of interest in simple explanations for businesses as to how **Rules of Origin** operate under the TCA. Two c. 15-minute long webinars are available that provide an introduction to Rules of Origin. These will help you understand the process and what you need to do if you buy from, send or sell goods to the EU.

BPDG also ran a programme of online Industry Days. These events provided practical details about moving goods between the EU and GB. They cover procedures and systems at the border and details about the new import requirements for GB.

On Monday 15 November BPDG launched a series of webinars which outline all the steps required to move goods from the EU to GB. These webinars explain how to import specific commodities from particular EU Member States into GB (for example, meat from Poland, or fish from Spain). The webinars are commodity specific and will act as a step by step guide and have been translated into five key languages including English and will focus on exporting goods from France, Portugal, Spain, Germany, Poland, Italy, Netherlands and Belgium to Great Britain.

UK Single Trade Window - Government needs your views

The 2025 Border Strategy sets out our vision for the UK border to be the most effective in the world. A Single Trade Window is a key component of the Strategy. The Government has committed £180 million to build a UK Single Trade Window which will reduce the cost of trade by streamlining trader interactions with border agencies.

There are a number of design choices to shape the services the UK Single Trade Window will offer. We have published a discussion paper which sets out a number of questions which we are seeking stakeholder views on to help inform this early design work. You can find the discussion paper here:
